Keynote



Martin F. Horn was appointed by Mayor Michael R. Bloomberg to serve as Commissioner of the New York City Department of Probation, effective Jan. 1, 2002.

Horn has extensive experience improving government operations and has held numerous executive posts, primarily in the criminal justice field.

Prior to his return to his home state of New York, he served as secretary of administration for the state of Pennsylvania. In addition to his responsibilities as secretary of administration, Horn served as a member of Governor Tom Ridge's Senior Staff, chaired the JNET Council (Justice Network); served as board member on the Pennsylvania Technology Investment Authority and directed enterprise-wide IT initiatives across Pennsylvania.

Prior to his selection as secretary of administration, Horn served, since March 1995, as Pennsylvania's secretary of corrections. While in that post, Horn is credited with implementing substantial security enhancements and an aggressive drug interdiction program, increasing drug and alcohol treatment within prisons and reducing inmate assaults. He managed an expansion of more than 8,000 inmates and instituted programs in citizenship and parenting.

Prior to his service with the Ridge Administration, Horn served in a number of criminal justice positions in New York State with the Division of Parole and the Department of Correctional Services.

Horn earned a bachelor's degree in government from Franklin and Marshall College in Lancaster, Pennsylvania in 1969, and a master's degree in criminal justice from John Jay College, City University of New York, in 1974.

Luncheon



Nick Nicholson received his B. S. (1990) & M.S. (1994) in Education from Southern Illinois University, and his Ph.D. in Police Administration from St. John's University in 1997. He is presently a professor in the Leadership Development Unit at the FBI Academy. Dr. Nicholson is the former Director of the Center for Civil Force Protection, a National Institute of Justice project designed to assist local and state governments in identifying potential vulnerabilities and recognizing ways to mitigate problems associated with terrorist acts. He served 12 years with the US Department of Energy (DOE) as a Special Agent. In his last assignment with DOE, he was the Special Agent in Charge of the Standards and Evaluation Section.

During his career he has conducted numerous vulnerability assessments (VA) of various government and private sector organizations' facilities, to include teaching the VA process in the Former Soviet Union (FSU). Additionally, Nick teaches several leadership and management courses at the University of New Mexico, Southern Illinois University and Webster University.

He has spent 25 years in law enforcement in numerous positions to include the Bureau Chief for Law Enforcement Training - State of New Mexico, a sergeant assigned to narcotic investigations and special response force commander. He is currently a member of the American Society of Industrial Security (ASIS), former Vice President of the FBI National Academy Associates (FBINAA) in New Mexico, the Vice Chairman of the American Society of Industrial Security's (ASIS) Law Enforcement Liaison Council, and a graduate of the FBI National Academy Session #176. He has published four books on security related subjects (Butterworth-Heinemann & Perpetuity Press), as well as numerous technical reports and professional journal articles.

Closing Session



Dr. Peter Scharf serves as Co-Director of the Center for Society, Law and Justice at the University of New Orleans. He received his doctorate from Harvard University and is the author of eight published books: including *Badge and the Bullet*, *Towards a Just Correctional System*, *Understanding the Computer Age*, and (forthcoming) *the Handbook of Forensic and Criminal Justice Technologies*. He has consulted with the Connecticut, Nevada, South Carolina, California, Washington and Alaska correctional systems and provides, through the Center, advanced IT planning services to the Office of Justice Systems. He was a keynote speaker at last year's CTA meeting in Raleigh, NC.

Dr. Scharf will draw together individual reports of the major issues presented to the CTA groups in breakout sessions. He will focus upon new emerging correctional technology, policy and value issues facing correctional technology professionals while highlighting the main theme of the conference and the application of IT in its understanding.

Information Security Breakout Sessions

Breakout Session	Description
1- Biometrics Overview	Several Business Partners will give an overview of major biometric technologies with pros and cons of each.
2- Real World Examples – 1	Various agencies describe how they implemented and utilize fingerprint technology. The presentations focus on what the business problem they needed to solve, how it works, and if they could do it all over, what would they keep and what would they change.
3- Real World Examples – 2	Various agencies describe how they implemented and utilize biometric technology other than fingerprint. The presentations focus on what the business problem was, how it works, and if they could do it all over, what would they keep and what would they change.
4- Disaster/Contingency Planning	In the wake of September 11 th attacks, these plans are increasingly important to maintain. What are the options for developing new plans, maintaining and updating existing plans, and how to keep them current.
5- Firewall Security	Myths and realities of firewalls. Latest trends, successes and pitfalls. Also, briefly discuss personal firewalls and why they are important to Corrections.
6- Inmate Access to Computers	What are different states doing and what are they protecting. A panel discussion on technologies being utilized to protect inmate use of computers against unauthorized access.
7- Wireless Security	There are many potential benefits of wireless, what are the risks, how can you protect information, and what are the options. First ½ will be general discussion of the technologies, and 2 nd half will be example of how wireless technology has been implemented.

Operational Security Breakout Sessions

Breakout Session	Descriptions
1- Offender Telephone Call Control, Monitoring and Recording	Heightened Security includes close monitoring of inmate phone calls. This presentation will update participants on the latest trends and technology in the Offender Telephone arena.
2- Security Surveillance in the Gaming Industry	David Natkin of Mandalay Group will give an overview of how the gaming industry is utilizing surveillance technology and how their work and techniques can and do help surveillance in Corrections.
3- Prison Entry/Exit Security	Sally Ports, Visiting Rooms, and Staff entrances all pose different and unique security risks in the Correctional environment. The presentation will include risk assessment and mitigation and the latest technologies in each of these areas.
4 -Identification Cards	The presentation will focus on current and future uses of this technology. Most agencies use them, what advantages do they have and what are the cons. How do ID cards fit into the overall operational security for Corrections.
5- Videoconferencing	What is it being used for, what are the real savings, how do you get people to utilize the equipment? Myths and realities of this technology.
6- Offender and Staff Locator Technology	Presentation will focus on the most recent technology and trends in this area and the challenges in implementing this technology.
