



As DOC increases detection measures and intercepts distribution, putting pressure on the supply, it creates a situation for more potent and even more compact alternatives. There's always been drugs in prisons, but right now the supply is much more toxic.



How can legal mail be processed without violating state laws, protecting confidentiality and affording access to the courts while also protecting staff and incarcerated people inside the walls from drug exposure?





GEO What are We Seeing in our Facilities?

Drugs in the Mail

- Mail sprayed with synthetic cannabinoids, liquid methamphetamines and/or spice
- Contraband concealed in the spines of books or sprayed on pages
- Attorneys used as an avenue when delivering legal mail
- Civilians becoming Amazon sellers or using third party companies to disguise books and magazines as being sent from a company



Resulting Issues from Drugs and Contraband Sent in Mail

Resulting Issues

- Increased assaults due to intoxication and accumulated debt
- Increased medical emergencies and injuries
- Increase in self-inflicted injuries and suicide attempts

Strains Resources

- Additional burden on staff and resources already stretched thin
- Preventable costs for medical treatment and transport
- Impacts staff morale and retention
- Legal expenses

C Solutions to Address the Problem

Potential Solutions

- Copying legal mail
- Communication between facilities/mailrooms on recent trends or known addresses
- Proactively monitoring offender communication
- Knock & Talks / Search Warrants when civilians are known to be in possession
- Communication with prosecutors to understand the problem to ensure individuals are held accountable







CT-Ray Screening Technologies

T-Ray Imaging

- Safe: No radiation
- Real-time 3-D video
- Weighs 10X less than X-ray
- Powders, liquids, treated paper, electronics, weapons, etc.







Contraband in Legal Mail

Common Substances Found:

- Synthetic Opioids: Fentanyl, oxycodone, morphine
- Synthetic Cannabinoids: K2, K3 and K4
- Opioid Medication: Suboxone
- Household Chemicals: Raid, Embalming Fluid, Oven Cleaner
- Cannabis and Cocaine




CIO Mail is not the Only Avenue for Smuggling
