Jim has over forty two years of experience in Emergency Medical Services, Fire Services, Emergency Management and Public Safety Communications. In each of these fields, he served as both a street-level provider and in various levels of management and leadership. He has received numerous national, state and local awards for admin-

Charitable Trusts


Adam Gelb directs Pew's public safety performance project, which helps states advance policies and practices in adult and juvenile sentencing and corrections that protect public safety, hold offenders accountable, and control corrections costs.

As the project lead, Gelb oversees Pew's assistance to states seeking a greater pub-

lic safety return on their corrections spending. He also supervises a vigorous research portfolio that highlights strategies for reducing recidivism while cutting costs. Gelb speaks frequently with the media about national trends and state innovations, and regularly advises policy makers on implementation of practical, cost-effective policies.

Gelb has been involved in crime control and prevention issues for the past 25 years as a journalist, congressional aide, and senior state government official. He began his career as a reporter at the Atlanta Journal-Constitution and staffed the U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee during negotiations and final passage of the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994. From 1995 to 2000, as policy director for the lieutenant governor of Maryland, Gelb was instrumental in developing several nationally recognized anti-crime initiatives. He served as executive director of the Georgia Sentencing Commission from 2001 to 2003. Before joining Pew, he was vice president for programs at the Georgia Council on Substance Abuse.

Gelb graduated from the University of Virginia and holds a master's degree from Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government.



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Hotel Floor Map





Exhibit Hall Map

Summary: This session provides an overview on the development of a PREA Data Standard created to address the information sharing challenges related to the Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA). Because there was no national consensus on what PREA data needed to be collected, individual interpretation prevailed, making cross-boundary information sharing, data comparisons among similar facilities or from

state to state, and quality assurance nearly impossible. This national effort is led by the IJIS Institute in partnership with the American Correctional Association (ACA), the American Jail Association (AJA), the American Probation and Parole Association (APPA), the Corrections Technology Association (CTA), the Council of State Governments Justice Center (CSG), the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), and the National Institute of Corrections (NIC). The collaborative effort addressed business processes and created a comprehensive data specification for PREA. The information standard addresses conformance in PREA-related processes, data identification, data collection, data reporting, and data sharing policies.

Summary: Jurisdictions around the nation are modernizing and integrating their Justice & Public Safety systems at an increasing pace. The choice of whether to roll out these projects in a single "big bang" or an incremental, phased implementation is often a difficult decision. Corrections agencies are at the center of this decision due to their position at the beginning of the booking/entry process. There is no right or wrong approach. Different business environments may drive a jurisdiction into one or the other of these implementation models. In this session we will compare and contrast the benefits and risks associated with Big Bang and Phased Implementations. Sierra-Cedar and Software AG will illustrate these considerations with real world lessons learned from recent projects in Orange County, CA, Shelby County, TN and San Mateo County, CA.



Summary: Modernizing and replacing systems continues to be an integral role in meeting the needs of Correctional Departments nationally.

Despite experience in their respective professional fields, correctional organizations rarely undergo a large system implementation. A significant piece of work required post-implementation is around Business acceptance. Substantial work is done prior to implementing a system; however the heavy lifting regarding Business Transformation happens when the technology is used operationally. The focus of the presentation will be on how Business Transformation (along with Change Management & Training) should be approached by the Business in order to position your organization for successful adoption and ongoing benefits realization. The presentation will include lessons learned from the ORCA implementation in Alberta and provide valuable insight into key transformational areas that Correctional organizations need to consider when implementing new Corrections technologies.

These three key inputs are: (1) Federal Grant Funding, (2) NIEM Standards, and (3) SOA-Service Oriented Architecture. The Department of Corrections – Technology Bureau recognized the importance of improving our offender data sharing model to be real-time delivery, with consistent and structured data, to the law enforcement community.

This project incorporated IJIS's philosophy that all law enforcement governing bodies adhere to a structured / standard methodology when sharing data as quoted below:

Summary: BC Corrections has implemented and evolved a portal that provides front line and corporate access to their full suite of criminal justice applications. It has three key aspects: it provides integrated data, reporting, and business intelligence for front line and corporate needs, it is a site for collaboration for all branch staff, and it is integral to the alerting and notification system for offender case management. The branch portal integrates custody and community users in a collaborative space allowing end to end offender assessment, planning and engagement. Offenders have recently been granted access to the portal for accessing personalized information and completing service requests. Criminal Justice agencies, such as Prosecution Services, can use the portal to access select information based on their agency and role.

The portal brings together disparate systems and data in a unified model to support evidence-based practice service delivery models and one truth strategic decision making. Dr. Gress is the Director of Research, Planning and Offender Programming at BC Corrections and a criminal justice researcher and educator at Simon Fraser University in Vancouver BC. In this presentation, Dr. Gress will



Summary: There is a need for mobile computer technology in the field to provide a more integrative criminal justice system by giving probation officers immediate access to information systems. This would provide access to probation case management system, court records and law enforcement systems improving communication, officer safety and efficiency. This workshop will demonstrate how mobile technology provided Probation Officers assistance out in the field. Field Officers were provided with tablets or iPads that allow them to access case notes, client information, and other information pertinent to their job duties. The technologist with the 19th Judicial Circuit in Lake County, Illinois developed a secure, stable and efficient method to connect remotely. These devices and tools are readily available in the market place. This has allowed officers in field to access real-time information without coming back to the office or making phone calls to the office to obtain realtime data. In case of emergency, supervisors and managers can easily find their location by using the GPS locator on the device – thus increasing officer safety. In addition, it has allowed officers (Adult Probation & Pretrial Bond Supervision Officers) to enter information in a timely fashion, freeing up time spent in the office to focus on monitoring and responding to probationers. By having mobile connectivity, they have been able to use the time spent outside of the office in a more efficient manner.

Innovate: Improving Parole Management with Mobile Client Application

Summary: Parole is the last line of defense for offender management and public

The presentation will discuss ways to help improve communication and monitoring for those on Parole.
