



#### MICHAEL DUKE Virginia Department of Corrections







#### Salon B Tubular Tips to Hang Ten - OMS Implementation Lessons

The purpose of this panel discussion is to discuss the challenges and opportunities that agencies and vendors face when implementing a new OMS. The presentation will discuss and provide examples of how open, honest communication as well leveraging a COTS-based OMS can lead to successful implementation. The interpretation of requirements can lead to disagreements regarding project scope and impact timelines and budget. At the executive level, having open and frequent communication regarding such issues when they arise is important for maintaining momentum and developing partnerships for shared success. Additionally, leveraging the capability of a COTS-based OMS against current business processes can enhance project implementation within established budget and expected time frames. This discussion will also feature successful "big bang" implementation of an OMS quickly leveraging "out-of-the-box" features and change management processes within a three-year timeframe. Finally, a community-based support model for establishing a product roadmap will be discussed.

#### Salon D Corrections 2033 - Rapid Technology Evolution and Its Impact on Correctional Operations

The COVID-19 pandemic forced a realization: modernization is no longer an

option, it is imperative to ensure that correctional organizations can continue to deliver critical services. Technology is one of the vehicles that can begin to realize the benefits of modernization efforts, and both Canada and Sweden are exploring how technology can enable solutions for the future. The presentation will discuss the various areas within their jurisdictions where technologies (such as AI, API layers, and Cloud-based applications) and innovation will enable the business of corrections. Exploration of shared commonalities, differences, challenges, and successes from a technology perspective will be explored, with an eye towards elevating outcomes past corrections and into potential societal or economic benefits. In addition, the questions of how to take lessons learned from the reaction to the pandemic, and how to affect modernization to enable stronger future outcomes within corrections will be discussed.



#### **CTA By-Laws Change**

Proposed change to Article IV: MEMBERSHIP, to:

- 1. Replace the semi-colon with colon;
- 2. Add Associate to the three types of membership categories; and
- 3. Under, A. Regular Members, remove the clause, "...the Association of State Correctional Administrators' (ASCA) representative in the U.S. or by...".

#### **Article IV: MEMBERSHIP**

There shall be three major classes of memberships;: Regular, **Associate** and Corporate Sponsor.

A. **Regular Members.** Persons having executive level responsibility for the management of information and/or operational technology resources for Corrections of their respective entity (federal, state, county, parish, municipality, province, or territory) as designated by the Association of State Correctional Administrators' (ASCA) representative in the U.S. or by the executive in charge of Corrections for the agency; and shall be voting members and have the right to cast one vote per entity.







Another stunning site to visit is the Burroughs Home & Gardens, which transports you all the way back to 1901. This Georgian Revival mansion played host to brilliant minds like Thomas Edison, Henry Ford and other affluent families in its time. More than 100 years later, you can still walk among the gardens or lounge in a rocking chair overlooking the river. The home itself is filled with period furniture and historical artifacts.

#### Afternoon

When lunchtime rolls around, you'll find quite an assortment of eateries. Embrace your inner Brit with tea, sandwiches and sweets at the quaint Wisteria Tea Room, or indulge in great beer selection and delicious gastropub fare at 10 Twenty Five. If you're looking for a quick bite to eat, you can't go wrong with the famous DHOP (Downtown House of Pizza).

After eating, stroll down First Street and browse through some of the local shops and take in the sights of the public artworks. If you're looking to plan out some of your activities ahead of time, consider a True Tour, which will guide you through the history and haunts of the downtown River District.

#### **Evening**

The possibilities are endless inside Chips Sports Pub, located below the Luminary Hotel & Co! This TopGolf Swing Suite offers interactive virtual simulators that are great for groups. Not a golfer? There are a variety of other virtual games available including Zombie Dodgeball, hockey, baseball, and football. If you're looking for live entertainment, check out the schedule for Professional Live Theater shows at The Florida Rep or one of the many events hosted at the Sidney & Berne Davis Art Center. Pro tip: Be sure to check out Sidney's, the rooftop sculpture garden and bar that is open most Wednesday nad Friday nights.

When hunger calls, you can relax at quaint restaurants that line First Street or enjoy Southern cuisine and timeless charm at The Veranda. The Oxbow Bar & Grill offers waterfront views of the Caloosahatchee River. And while the sun is setting, sip on a craft cocktail at the Beacon Social Drinkery, a rooftop bar atop the Luminary Hotel & Co.

#### **Late Night**

What's a vacation without a bit of bar hopping? Start at the newest bar in downtown, the Lucky Screw. Then pay homage to the prohibition era at The 86 Room, where jazz music and moonshine embody speakeasies in every way. Finally, round off a night well-spent at the openair downtown Social House.
